MEDICINE HAT, AB - The Medicine Hat Utilities

Ratepayer Association wants the city to eliminate

a utility fee that was put in place four years ago and held a news conference Thursday to emphasize its request.

The association, in a letter sent to council and written by president Sounantha Boss earlier this week, criticized the municipal consent access fee on the city-owned utility company that is paid for

by taxing residents. "This fee, introduced in 2019 from the previous council, was only meant to be a temporary fee to

address the large deficit at the time," Boss told reporters from inside her restaurant Thai Orchid Room. "As of this moment, this fee has served its purpose

and must be eliminated. The fee is now a burden on hard working Medicine Hat families and
